The grass, flowers and shrubbery must be mowed or trimmed at regular intervals so as to maintain them in a neat and attractive manner. There have been few violations of this covenant.

Our streets have taken a hit during this long and hot summer however, and we must help do our part to keep the streets from coming apart. The way we trim our yards can help with maintaining the streets! Be sure to edge the grass off the curb when trimming, as the grass that grows over the curb will undermine the street and make pot holes and cracks to appear. Also, leaving trimmings in the streets will let it wash into the drainage which is bad for the lakes. The city of Flowood has patched several streets lately, yet more really need patching.



Dead Bushes!


There are very few houses in Laurelwood that did not lose shrubbery or trees to the extreme draught of this past summer. If you have a few or just one or two, there may be questions about what to do about it, which is why we have this article in this month's newsletter.

Winter is the best time to replace those dead bushes. Use loppers to remove the branches of the shrub a little at a time until you finally get to the stump. Then use a spade to dig away soil until you can see a root. Use the loppers to cut the root. It helps a lot at this point to have someone pull on the stump while you cut the root. Continue in this fashion until the stump lifts out of the ground.

Choosing new plants may seem intimidating to someone who doesn't know much about them. How will you know which one to pick? The answer is, you don't have to know the names of any plants, just the name of a good nursery. Get out your measuring tape and measure your planting space. You may want to take a photo of the area showing the surrounding plantings. Be sure to note the exposure--sunny, shady, north, south, east or west.

A final word about planting your new shrub. The planting hole needs only to be as deep as the container the plant comes in, but it should be three or four times as wide. Before planting the plant, gently slide it out of the container to be sure it is not totally root bound . When you place the plant into the prepared hole, spread the roots out as much as possible. It might be necessary to actually slice down the side of the root mass with a knife in a couple places to release the roots. You want them to spread outward as they grow, not grow in a circle eventually strangling the plant. Even if the soil is damp when you plant, always water in your new occupant to make sure there are no gaping air pockets near the roots.

Brown

Brown is the dominant color of Thanksgiving because the main course at a Thanksgiving meal is turkey.
